## *Site Selection* Publishes Annual Canadian Rankings

Atlanta, September 1, 2009: Alberta remains the most competitive province in an increasingly competitive nation, followed by Québec and Ontario. Calgary and Vancouver lead Canada's metro areas in corporate facility development. And the approaches of certain local economic developers are just as innovative as the country's showcase blend of research infrastructure, natural resources, innovation and collaborative spirit.

Those are the conclusions reached as *Site Selection* publishes its third annual Canadian awards and rankings, based on June 2008-May 2009 project data derived from the publication's proprietary New Plant Database (which counts projects according to specific criteria related to new construction) and the magazine's own research:

- **The Canadian Competitiveness Awards**, awarded to the leading provinces based on the number of qualifying new facilities and expansions, projects per capita, project capital investment per capita, project job creation per capita, 100-plus-jobs projects per capita and most metro areas in the total list of Top Canadian Metros;
- **Top Canadian Groups**, recognizing local economic development groups based on total projects, total project investment and new jobs, investment and jobs per capita, collaboration, quality data, and innovative programming and Web tools;
- **Top Canadian Metros**, based on a tally of new corporate projects and expansions qualifying for the Conway Data New Plant Database.

"Consistency in corporate project attraction, job creation, collaboration, proactive programming and quality data resources distinguishes *Site Selection's* Top Economic Development Groups of 2009," says Adam Bruns, managing editor of *Site Selection*. The entire Canada 2009 report, including an economic development directory, appears in the September 2009 edition of *Site Selection* and will be posted at [www.siteselection.com](http://www.siteselection.com) on Sept. 17.

"We make sure Canada is covered in every issue of *Site Selection*, from provincial and Canada-U.S. border reports to coverage of new projects in our industry reports," says Mark Arend, editor in chief of *Site Selection*.
